GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

- **RULE 1.** The Johnson County Fair Board reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters and differences that may arise which are not covered by them.
- **RULE 2.** No disorderly conduct of any kind will be permitted. Minors are expected to be under adult supervision any time they are on the grounds. Curfew is 11pm in all livestock barns.
- RULE 3. Open class static (not livestock) exhibits need to be pre-registered by July 25th, and will be accepted at the Exhibit Hall from 12pm to 4pm on Sunday, July 27th. Pre-registration of entries is required so entry tags will be waiting when entries are brought in for display. Entry forms may be picked up at the Fair Office or Johnson County Extension office, or printed from www.johnsocountyfairgrounds.com. Paper open class entry forms are due July 21th by 4pm and must be submitted to the Fair Board Office or Extension Office.
- RULE 4. 4-H, FFA, and OPEN LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS MUST BE REGISTERED WITH THE JOHNSON COUNTY EXTENSION OFFICE ONLINE ENTRY BY JULY 6TH at 5pm. Stalls, pens, and bulk shavings (until exhausted) will be furnished free to exhibitors, but the owner will be expected to feed and care for all livestock and attend to the cleaning and bedding of stalls. EXHIBITORS OF ANY ANIMAL NOT BEING FED AND WATERED MAY BE ASKED TO REMOVE THAT ANIMAL FROM THE GROUNDS BY THE FAIR BOARD AND BE EXCLUDED FROM PARTICIPATING IN FUTURE FAIRS.
- **RULE 5.** Only animals entered in the Johnson County Fair will be allowed to be housed in the livestock barn during fair week.
- **RULE 6.** All livestock entries in the Johnson County Fair must be in healthy condition and must be able to comply with sanitary regulations governing livestock as set forth by the Wyoming Livestock and Sanitary Board for all livestock in County and State Fairs. Livestock will be required to remain on the fairgrounds facility following weigh-ins and/or carcass ultrasounds. Biosecurity is the implementation of measures to prevent the introduction of disease into a healthy population of animals or limit the spread of disease once introduced. Our animal biosecurity is primarily designed on minimizing the risk of serious disease, with that being said the Fair Board cannot guarantee there will be no animal health issues. There is always a risk when bringing livestock to town but the Fair Board and Livestock Committee hopes these steps will help minimize the risks.

The most important steps to ensure healthy animals start at home, so please be mindful of your animals' health and if you determine you have a sick animal do not bring it to the Fairgrounds. It is the responsibility of the owner of any animals coming to fair to work with your superintendent and a veterinarian to ensure your animal is healthy and does not pose a health risk to other animals or people. A veterinarian health inspection prior to entering the Johnson County Fairgrounds is not required but recommended. All animals entering the Wyoming State Fairgrounds are required to have a vet health check with the accompanying health certificate.

During check-ins & weigh-ins there will not be a veterinarian onsite to inspect animals. The Fair Board will also require all 4-H and FFA breeding animals, along with open class animals, to check in at the appropriate species weigh-in station. If upon arrival at the Fairgrounds, a superintendent, Fair board member, or UWE 4-H Educator suspects an animal health issue the animal may be required to be removed from the Fairgrounds and a request will be made to have

a vet health check. The Fair Board may also request to have a veterinarian on call throughout Fair week if any animal health issues arise to ensure prompt action.

- **RULE 7.** Any animal deemed to be unhealthy by veterinarian may be asked to leave the grounds by Livestock Committee and or Fair Board member.
- **RULE 8.** Departments for the Fair are open to Johnson County residents and Johnson County property owners only. Exception 4-H Departments 16 & 18. 4-H members do not have to reside in the County but must be enrolled in 4-H in Johnson County. Proof of residency and property ownership may be requested.
- **RULE 9.** The Johnson County Fair Board will use all diligence to ensure the safety of stock and articles after their arrival. The Johnson County Fair Board and the Superintendents will not be responsible for theft or damage of any entry.
- **RULE 10.** No animals will be allowed on the Johnson County Fairgrounds before 6AM on the 1st Sunday of Fair. Campers can arrive on the grounds starting at 8am the Friday before fair.
- RULE 11. Animals may be removed from the fairgrounds after the Stock Sale on Saturday night. All Open class exhibits & ribbons are to be removed only between 2:00-6:00 pm on the last Sunday of Fair. 4H & FFA static exhibits can be picked up 1:00 4:00 pm on the last Sunday of fair. The Fair Board will not be responsible for any entries remaining on the grounds after 6pm on the last day of Fair.
- **RULE 12.** The management reserves the right to reject any unworthy exhibits of any kind by refusing space or admission to the grounds.
- **RULE 13.** Limits on the number of entries made by an open class exhibitor will be specified in each Division's rules. Articles entered in previous County or State Fairs may not be entered into competition, but may be exhibited for "Exhibit Only" They will not be judged. All entries will be judged for quality of work. Special awards may be presented to the outstanding exhibitor in Open Class Departments as donations are received. All awards will be left to the discretion of the Fair Board.
- **RULE 14.** Professionals are welcome and encouraged to exhibit at the Johnson County Fair. A professional is one who teaches for a fee or makes a practice of selling completed works.
- **RULE 15.** Exhibit halls will open to the public at 1pm to 8pm on Tuesday of Fair Week. Wednesday throught Saturday, hours will be 9am to 8pm and Sunday 9am to 12pm.
- **RULE 16.** All Open class premiums not picked up in person by the 2nd Thursday after fair will be forfeited.

SUPERINTENDENTS

- **RULE 17.** The Superintendent will have charge of all assistants in his/her Department. He/she may, at his/her discretion, discharge any assistant under him/her.
- **RULE 18.** It shall be the duty of each Superintendent to fully inform the judges and clerks in his/her Department as to the rules and regulations governing awards and to urge them to carefully read the rules.
- **RULE 19.** Each Superintendent is reponsible for seeing each exhibit is tagged and judged. The Superintendent must see that all special awards are duly and properly posted to the public and recorded.
- **RULE 20.** No one shall be allowed to employ help or order supplies without the approval of the Fair Board.





POLICY OF THE FAIR AND GROUNDS

- **RULE 21.** The Johnson County Fair is sponsored by the Board of Johnson County Commissioners.
- **RULE 22.** The Fair Board reserves the right to withhold any award, trophy, and premiums if paid, or any other monetary gift if it has been determined that the individual's conduct during the fair or associated activities has been inappropriate. All judgment will be made by the Fair Board. The Fair Board reserves the right to secure advice and information from other groups or individuals, as needed.
- **RULE 23.** Forfeited awards may be given to another at the discretion of the Fair Board.
- **RULE 24.** No soliciation of any kind will be allowed on the grounds unless approved by the Fair Board.
- **RULE 25.** Applications for concessions should be addressed to the Fair Board and submitted no less than 30 days prior to the Fair. The Fair Board reserves the right to revoke any concession. All concessions will be required to maintain fire extinguishers at their respective booth at all times during the Fair.
- **RULE 26.** The fairgrounds and facilities may be leased subject to approval of the Fair Board.
- **RULE 27.** Anyone using the fairgrounds will be required to make a deposit. This deposit will be forfeited if grounds are not left in satisfactory condition. Contact the Fair Board's Business Office for deposit information at 307-684-7357.
- **RULE 28.** No livestock showing evidence of infections or contagious disease or illness will be allowed on the Johnson County Fairgrounds.
- **RULE 29.** Golf Carts are to be operated by licensed drivers only. ATV's & Side x Sides must be licensed and operated by licensed drivers only. The Fair Board Reserves the right to require operators to park these vehicles at any time upon request of a Fair Board Member.
- **RULE 30.** NO BICYCLES WILL BE ALLOWED ON THE JOHNSON COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS DURING FAIR OR EQUINE EVENTS.
- **RULE 31.** DOGS ARE ALLOWED IN CAMPING AREAS. DOGS **ARE NOT ALLOWED** AT SHOWS, NEAR SHOWS CLOSE TO LIVESTOCK OR AT THE RODEO.



Read General Rules and Regulations in front of book and specific requirements for this Department.

- **RULE 1.** All culinary exhibits must be products of the "home kitchen" and be presented for exhibit in clean, attractive re-sealable containers as designated in each division.
- **RULE 2.** Entries should be exhibitor's best work. More than one item may be entered in each class as long as the recipes indicate obvious differences in the preparation methods.
- RULE 3. Recipes: Required for Divisions 1-5 and 15
- RULE 4. Attach securely to exterior of product container with one piece of clear tape.
- RULE 5. Labels: Required for Divisions 6-14
- **RULE 6.** See division information for items to include on the label. Recipes are appreciated, but not required. If included, Attach securely to exterior of product container with one piece of clear tape. **DO NOT write your name on entries, labels, or recipes.**
- **RULE 7.** Perishable exhibits may be picked up Tuesday afternoon. A portion will be kept for display and discarded at the end of Fair.
- **RULE 8.** Exhibitors offering borrowed or purchased products as their own work will forfeit all rights to participate in judged awards.
- **RULE 9.** Baking box mix products can be accepted in Division 15 <u>only</u>. See the division information for entry requirements.
- **RULE 10.** Exhibits that require refrigeration must be dropped off in a cooler with ice/cooling packs. Refrigeration **WILL NOT** be provided. Otherwise, please wait to bring your item until the latest drop off time.

- RULE 1. Canned products must be processed by hot water bath or pressure canner, using current USDA methods, for this altitude in clean, clear, vacuum-sealed, heat-proof, standardized jars. Processing date must be within one year of entry date. If this is not done, the products will be disqualified.
- **RULE 2.** Ingredient list or recipes are not required, but are helpful to the judges.
- **RULE 3.** Due to USDA requirements, preservation methods and products that cannot be accepted include, but are not limited to the following: steam canning and ground meat jerky.
- **RULE 4.** Entries may be opened to test consistency and flavor. After judging, opened entries can be picked up at any time. Please bring a replacement for display.
- **RULE 5. Labels Required.** Include the following information on all entry labels: food items, processing method, date processed.

Additionally, for water bath products include the processing time. For pressure canned products include the processing time and pounds of pressure for this altitude.

- RULE 6. Hints from the WY State Fair Book to harden off your flower exhibit:
 - a. Cut no later than the day before it is to be exhibited.
 - b. Cutting in late afternoon, when greatest amount of sugar has ascended into the leaves and blooms is best.
 - c. Flower stems should be cut cleanly at an angle with a sharp knife or pruning shears and plunged into deep cool water at once.
 - d. After cutting and water treatment, specimens should be kept in cool, darkened room for several hours until water has come to room temperature.
 - e. Add ice to the water and leave the flower material undisturbed overnight or place in refrigerator for 6 hours or more before they are to be shown.
 - f. Flowers prepared in this way improve their substance and will hold their freshness longer.



DIVISION 1108 Wool

PURPOSE – The wool show encourages improved wool production, stimulates interest and knowledge in the proper preparation of wool for marketing, and informs the public on the versatile uses of wool as a high-quality textile fiber.

DISPLAY FLEECES – All Johnson County sheep producers are encouraged to bring wool to the fair! If a producer does not want to be entered in a division for judging, an area will be provided for producers to display a fleece from their flock along with information they may provide regarding ranch name and history.

- **RULE 1.** FLEECES WILL BE SHOWN <u>UNTIED</u> IN CLEAR, BREATHABLE PLASTIC BAGS.
- RULE 2. Youth exhibitors are encouraged to also exhibit in the Open Wool Show, must pre-enter the same fleeces. Exhibitors will abide by all applicable policies governing the Wyoming State Fair. Exhibitors may enter (2) two fleeces in any one class, and entries may be made in as many classes as desired. An individualt fleece may be be entered in (1) one class only. Any fleece entered in both the Youth and Open Shows must be entered in the same class with the same name. After screening, som fleeces may be removed so that the higher placing fleeces can be properly displayed for public viewing.
- RULE 3. ELIGIBILITY OF FLEECES: Each fleece must have been shorn in the current calander year and represent 12 months of growth or less. Yearling fleeces will be allowed 16 months growth. Exhibitor's fleeces must be produced by the exhibitor (come from sheep owned by the exhibitor).
- RULE 4. CRITERION: Fleeces shall be faulted for: a) paints or tar brands (soluble branding paints allowed), b) excessive tags, c)

moisture discoloration, d) a break or week staple, e) cotted, f) excessive vegetable matter or burrs. Fleeces showing black fiber will be disqualified.

- RULE 5. PREPARATION OF FLEECES: Fleeces must not be tied but must be prepared in the same fashion. Spread out the fleece on a clean table or floor. Remove all heavy tags, stained wool and obvious foreign matter. Roll the fleece in the following manner: 1) Begin at one side and loosely fold 8 to 10 inches toward the center of the fleece: 2) Do the same on the other side, but fold toward the center 2 times until the twice folded portion lies on top of the first fold: 3) Fold in the head wool: 4) Roll the entire fleece from the breech toward the shoulder and long side wool. Fleece SHOULD NOT contain belly wool. Place fleece in a clear, breathable plastic bag. One fleece per bag.
- RULE 6. All Fleeces must be entered by fair deadline and delivered to the Exhibit Hall, wool area between 1-4 the first Sunday of Fair

PURPOSE:

- 1. To interest producers and consumers in the selection of better eggs.
- 2. To demonstrate and teach essentials of good packing and careful handling so as to prevent losses
- 3. To call attention to the high food value of eggs.
 - **RULE 1.** Eggs shall average 24 ounces to the dozen, and there shall be no eggs less than an average of 23 ounces to the dozen.
 - **RULE 2.** Uniformity of Shape Each egg must conform as nearly as possible. Cut from one-half to two points for each egg off its uniformity.
 - RULE 3. Uniformity of color all eggs in each entry to be of the same shade of color, if white, all eggs should be pure white and free from any tints. If brown, the color may be any shade of brown, but all eggs of each entry should be uniformly the same shade. Cut from one-half to two points for each egg off in color.

- **RULE 1.** All competition in this Department will be open to both irrigated and dry farm products of Johnson County only.
- **RULE 2.** Agricultural exhibits must be the product of the current year's crop except in case of corn and threshed forage seed which may be the product of this year and the previous year.
- **RULE 3.** Exhibits will not be eligible for competition unless the amount of number stipulated in the Class is shown.
- RULE 4. No exhibitor will be permitted to make more than one entry of the same variety in any one class.
- **RULE 5.** All threshed grain samples shall measure one quart; sheaf grain, 2 ½ inches in diameter at the butt; and forage samples, 3 inches in diameter at the butt, except Millets, Sudan's & Sorghums which will measure 5 inches in diameter at the butt.
- RULE 6. Oats must not be clipped.
- **RULE 7.** Sheaf and threshed grain must be named.
- RULE 8. All grain must be thoroughly cleaned.
- RULE 9. Classes will be made for entries not listed.

HINTS TO EXHIBITORS

- 1. In judging threshed grain, the points most considered are purity, uniformity, and the fitness of the sample for the purpose for which the particular grain is used.
- 2. In sheaf samples of grain, the evidence of both yielding ability and the condition of the samples is regarded as important.
- 3. Sheaves of grain are not judged for their forage qualities.

PREPARATION OF SAMPLES

- SHEAF GRAINS Go to the field a few days before grain is ready to cut. Select samples and with a knife cut them close to the ground, so as to get the full length of the straw. Do not break straw in handling. Spread samples on a board in the sun to bleach. When green color is entirely gone and straw is perfectly dry, bind in bundles, tying with a soft cloth which will not cut the straw. Tie snugly in at least three (3) places. Then hang in dry place with head down until time for exhibition. Remove all leaves from plants to be used in the grain sample.
- 2. **THRESHED GRAINS** Take sample from bin of threshed grain. Thoroughly clean with all grain mixtures, cracked kernels and weed seed being removed with a grain grader or fanning mill.



PREPARATION OF SAMPLES (CONTINUED)

- 3. SHEAF FORAGE EXHIBITS Select the leafiest types to be found in the field the best individual specimens obtainable and cut close to the ground. DO NOT select specimens with coarse, woody stems. Place in loose bundles not more than five to seven inches in diameter or less than three inches and wrap loosely in a newspaper or cheese cloth. Then hand head down, in a dark place to cure. Do not strip a single leaf or branchlet from the stem, as forage should retain its color and leaves. In making the show bundles, select those individual stems that have retained the most leaves with their color. Make bundles three to five inches in diameter below the heads, and tie securely in at least three places except on short bundles on which only two are necessary.
- 4. CORN Go into the field a week before display is to be gathered and, by stripping back the husks, select ears of uniform size. On those which are selected for show, draw the husk back in place and wrap the ear in a square of newspaper, tying with a string or rubber band. This will hasten the maturity of the corn. Within two or three days it will tint so to definitely settle its color, and within a week or ten days it will harden sufficiently for exhibition purposes.

- **RULE 3.** Entries must be made on a Johnson County Fair Entry from and must be turned in to the Extension Office no later than July 6. The Extension Agent will arrange to core the bales for nutrient analysis.
- **RULE 4.** Exhibitor will receive an analysis of the hay including crude protein, TDN, crude fiber, calcium, phosphorus, and a calculation of Relative Feed Value.
- **RULE 5.** Hay entered must have been grown in Johnson County during the current year.
- **RULE 6.** Each entry will consist of five (5) conventional size bales, either twine or wire tied.

- **RULE 4.** Part of the sample will be retained for display at the Fair. Bales of hay will not be displayed in this section of the contest.
- **RULE 5.** Hay entered must have been grown in Johnson County during the current year.

Johnson County Fair Livestock Show Rules

The Johnson County Livestock Committee has adopted the following guidelines/rules to provide a platform for exhibitors to showcase their efforts in an equitable manner at the fair. It is our intent that the following document be utilized to educate more than regulate our livestock exhibitors. The Johnson County Livestock Committee will have the final say in all decisions regarding the guidelines/rules. Any discrepancies should be addressed to the Johnson County Livestock Committee at one of the regularly scheduled meetings. The policies and by-laws outlined in this booklet were voted on and approved by the Johnson County Livestock Committee on (2/7/2023).

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WYOMING STATE FAIR GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

- **RULE 6.** Johnson County Exhibitors have traditionally been very competitive at the Wyoming State Fair. Thus, the Johnson County Livestock Committee has adopted the WY State Fair rules to prepare our exhibitors for the state level and to provide a detailed and thorough set of guidelines for the Johnson County Fair.
- **RULE 7.** Please refer to the Wyoming State Fair Book www.wystatefair.com for a more detailed explanation of all rules pertaining to each project area, as well as the International Association of Fairs and Expositions National Code of Show Ring Ethics.
- **RULE 8.** Note that the minimum/maximum weights for market animals at the Johnson County Fair shall be the same as the **previous** Wyoming State Fair. These weights are subject to change, for current verification please refer to the previous Wyoming State Fair Premium Book for individual weight requirements for each species or contact a member of the Johnson County Livestock Committee.
- **RULE 9.** All 4-H and FFA Exhibitors going to the Wyoming State Fair must notify the Extension Office or their FFA Advisor of their intent to participate in the Wyoming State Fair. Contact these parties prior to the conclusion of the Johnson County Fair. We encourage all exhibitors to attend the state fair.
- **RULE 10.** Please read and adhere to the rules outlined in the Johnson County Fair Exhibitor Book. The rules outlined in the Johnson County Fair Exhibitor Book cover rules of the fairgrounds and rules pertaining to the county fair.

4H & FFA GENERAL RULES

- **RULE 11.** Johnson County 4-H and FFA Members who have graduated from high school but have not exceeded the national membership ages (18 as of January 1st for 4-H and 21 for FFA) will be allowed to show and sell at the Johnson County Fair and 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale.
- **RULE 12.** Animals weighing less than minimum weight (established by the Wyoming State Fair) may be shown in a feeder class and in showmanship. They will <u>NOT</u> be eligible for sale at the Johnson County 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale.
- **RULE 13.** Weights will be absolute. No re-weighing will be allowed at the Johnson County Fair. Scales will be balanced to zero (0) before each animal enters the scale. All Animals offered for sale at the JC Junior Livestock Sale will be weight at the fairgrounds.
- **RULE 14.** The scale head at each scale will be available for the exhibitor to see what their animal weighs and a ticket system with a carbon copy will be issued to the youth exhibitor and the weighing party to minimize discrepancies.
- **RULE 15.** A <u>mandatory</u> member and parent meeting will follow the weigh-in on the Monday of Fair week. The time will be posted in the fair schedule.
- **RULE 16.** One family animal is allowed per household, only allowed in one species, the family members eligible to show this animal must be competing in the same species, the household must declare who is showing the family animal before any of the household animals may be weighed in. If an animal is not already claimed by a family exhibitor at the time entries are due, all family



members must enter the animal in its prospective class or they will have missed the deadline and the animal will not be able to be shown. If early declaration of ownership is determined please contact your superintendent and let them know. Family animals may only be shown by

- **RULE 17.** It is mandatory that all market animals be tagged with a Wyoming State Fair tag prior to ownership dates set by the Wyoming State Fair.
 - a. No market animal will be allowed to weigh in at the Johnson County Fair without a Wyoming State Fair tag. (Goats and Lambs must also have a USDA/APHIS approved Scrapie Identification)
 - b. Market animals must be tagged by a Johnson County University of Wyoming Extension Educator, Johnson County FFA advisor, or designated Livestock Committee member/superintendent. It is the member's responsibility to have animals at the scheduled weigh-ins or prior arrangements are to be made. If members cannot make it to a tag-in date they must make arrangements with the Johnson County Extension Educator, a Johnson County FFA Advisor or a species designated superintendent. This must be done during business hours.
- **RULE 18.** Title/brand inspection must be shown at tagging for proof of ownership. Goats, sheep and beef must come to the fair with a brand inspection/title unless raised from the child's own herd. The brand inspection/title is to be turned in with the consignment for so proper sale forms can be written.
- **RULE 19.** 4-H and FFA members may tag as many animals as they wish to bring to fair. However, no more than two (2) animals per weight class will be shown. Each animal, market or breedign needs to be entered individually on the entry form. Each market animals needs to be identified by a state fair tag number.
- **RULE 20.** An animal will not be shown or sold at the Johnson County Fair if the owner is not available when the member's name is called three (3) times. Prior arrangements need to be made in special circumstances with the livestock committee.
- **RULE 21.** Only animals to be exhibited at the Johnson County Fair may be brought onto the fairgrounds.
- **RULE 22.** 4H or FFA members showing market animals at Johnson County Fair are allowed to sell one animal only each year through the Johnson County Livestock Sale.
- **RULE 23.** All Animals shown in department 16 and 17 must be carried as a 4H or FFA project and owned by the individual according to eh rules of their prospective program.
- **RULE 24.** All exhibitors of Grand Champion and Reserve Champtions are expected to participate in the Parade of Champions.
- **RULE 25.** Pens will be cleaned after the release of livestock. Market animals left for delivery will be cared for before leaving the grounds by participate and pens cleaned after the animal leaves the grounds.



SHOWMANSHIP

- RULE 26. Showmanship is a compulsory entry at the Johnson County Fair.
- **RULE 27.** Members that do not participate in showmanship classes are not allowed to participate in any market class. Participation in a market class is required to be eligible for the 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale. Therefore, individuals not participating in a Showmanship class (within the species they consign) will not be allowed to sell an animal at the 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale.
- **RULE 28.** Each member must have individual ownership of the animal used for showmanship class. Allowing another member, the use of your showmanship animal will result in disqualification of both participants. Members in both 4-H and FFA may <u>NOT</u> enter the same animal in both showmanship classes. Members unable to show due to unforeseen circumstances must make prior arrangements with Johnson County Livestock Committee/Superintendents.
- **RULE 29.** The dress code for **all** junior livestock events will be clean, collared shirt with neat, clean pants. No open-toed shoes or shorts will be allowed in the show or sale ring.
- RULE 30. FFA participants must show in Official Dress for showmanship.



- **RULE 31.** Beef Superintendents will have discretion regarding barn assignments, tie-outs, show orders, etc., and shall field any questions regarding the beef project at the Johnson County Fair. Please work in cooperation with this volunteer.
 - a. Beef tie-outs must be in the barn by 8:00 AM and must be tied-out by 8:00 pm.
- RULE 32. The Johnson County Cattlemen's Supreme Cow Contest:
 - a. For further rules pertaining to this project area please consult the Johnson County Cattlemen.
- **RULE 33.** Market heifers will be shown with market steers and will compete for overall champion market beef at the Johnson County Fair.
- RULE 34. BANGS vaccination for heifers will be enforced by the Beef Superintendent.
- **RULE 35.** Proof of ownership is to be brought to fair. The brand inspection/title is to be turned in at fair with consignment forms for consigned animals only.
- **RULE 36.** Beef Weigh in will be from 12pm to 3pm the 1st Sunday of Fair. The Beef Ultra Sound contest will be from 2:00pm to 3pm the 1st Saturday of Fair



- **RULE 37.** Sheep Superintendents will have discretion regarding barn assignments, show orders, etc., and shall field any questions regarding the sheep project at the Johnson County Fair. Please work in cooperation with this volunteer.
- RULE 38. All sheep must have Scrapie tags.
- **RULE 39.** These numbers will be recorded at initial tagging and weighing.
- RULE 40. Tail Docking (as per Wyoming State Fair)
- **RULE 41.** All market lambs need to be shorn once prior to weighing in at the Johnson County Fair. **NO WET** lambs will be weighed. No blankets, tubes, or leg wraps on lambs during weighing.



- **RULE 42.** Proof of ownership is to be brought to fair. The brand inspection/title is to be turned in at fair with consignment forms for consigned animals only.
- **RULE 43.** Sheep Weigh in will be from 11am to 2pm the 1st Sunday of Fair. The Sheep Ultra Sound contest will be from 12:30 to 2 the 1st Sunday of Fair



- **RULE 44.** Swine Superintendents will have discretion regarding barn assignments, show orders, etc., and shall field any questions regarding the swine project at the Johnson County Fair. Please work in cooperation with this volunteer.
- **RULE 45.** All swine must be on grounds by 10AM the 1st Sunday of fair.
- **RULE 46.** Swine exhibitors will be required to show up to the scale with clean hogs. Pigs MUST be free of mud, washed and dry.
 - a. The RFID tag needs to be legible so that the tag can be read or scanned.
 - b. Limit of Three (3) Market Swine per Showman at the Johnson County Fair, due to space limitations.
- **RULE 47.** Swine must come to the Johnson County Fair with proof of ownership. Proof of ownership is to be turned in with consignment forms for consigned animals only.
- **RULE 48.** Swine weigh in is from 7am to 12pm the 1st Sunday of Fair. The Swine Ultra Sound Contest is from 10am to 12:30pm the 1st Sunday of Fair




- **RULE 49.** Goat Superintendents will have discretion regarding barn assignments, show orders, etc., and shall field any questions regarding the goat project at the Johnson County Fair. Please work in cooperation with this volunteer.
- **RULE 50.** All market goats must have Scrapie tags. All breeding goats must have a USDA/APHIS approved Scrapie Identification.

a. These numbers will be recorded at initial tagging and weighing.

- RULE 51. NO WET market goats will be weighed. No blankets, tubes, or leg wraps on market goats during weighing.
- RULE 52. Commercial, non-registered meat bucks will be allowed to show at the Johnson County Fair.
- **RULE 53.** Goats must come to the fair with proof of ownership. Proof of ownership is to be turned in with consignment forms for consigned animals only.
- RULE 54. Johnson County will allow horned goats in the market show.
- **RULE 55.** Goat Weigh in will be from 11am to 2pm the 1st Sunday of Fair. The Goat Ultra Sound contest will be from 12:30 to 2 the 1st Sunday of Fair

POULTRY

- **RULE 56.** Rabbit and Poultry check in will be from 3pm to 5pm the 1st Sunday of Fair.
- **RULE 57.** 4-H, FFA, and Open Class Poultry check-ins will be posted on the Fair Schedule. All birds coming to the Johnson County Fair shall remain on the Fairgrounds for the duration of Fair unless removal is authorized by the Poultry Superintendent or veterinarian for health reasons.
- **RULE 58.** Upon check-in, the Poultry Superintendent designates barn assignments, show orders, etc., and will field any questions regarding poultry projects at the Johnson County Fair. All poultry must be free of apparent illness, disease, or parasites. A vet check prior to coming to the Fair is highly recommended. Birds are weighed only at check-in with the exhibitors declaring their pen of three at that time.
- **RULE 59.** Birds are judged according to the American Standard of Perfection as authorized by the American Poultry Association. Clean birds are expected.
- **RULE 60.** Breeding birds must be owned by May 1st, Pullets or Cockerels that are chirping at fair will be sent home. They are not old enough and do not have the antibodies to be away from home.
- **RULE 61.** Market Poultry requirements to sell in the Junior Livestock Auction: Chickens may be any commercially accepted meat breed (ex. Cornish broiler). Birds entered in any other classes are not eligible to compete in this market class and are not eligible to sell in the Junior Livestock Sale. In order to avoid over-finished birds, they must meet age requirements (8-10 weeks of age as of weigh-in). A minimum weight of 5.5 lbs. is required to sell at the 4-H/FFA Livestock Auction. Only one (1) pen per person for market and the birds must stand and walk on own.
- RULE 62. Other Meat Production Birds which may be sold:
 - a. Turkeys: shown as a pen of 3.
 - b. Hens 15 to 20 weeks should weigh 16 to 25 lbs. at weigh in. Toms 15 to 22 weeks should weigh 22 to 41 lbs.
 - c. Ducks: Shown as a pen of 3.
 - d. Standard Meat Ducks: 12 to 24 weeks old weigh 8lbs to 15 lbs.
 - e. Jumbo Meat Ducks: 12 to 24 weeks old weigh 9lbs. to 18 lbs.
- **RULE 63.** Market geese-gosling shown as a pen of 3 of either sex weights are as follow:
 - a. Heavy Weight Gander 20 to 28 weeks old, 22 to 26 lbs. Goose: 20 to 28 weeks old 18 to 20 lbs.
 - b. Medium Weight Gander 20 to 28 weeks old 14 to 18 lbs. Goose 20 to 28 weeks old 12 to 16 lbs.
 - c. Lightweight Gander 20 to 28 weeks 6 to 12 lbs. Goose 20 to 28 weeks 4 to 10 lbs.



RULE 65. Rabbits will be judged by the Standard of Perfection ARBA.

RULE 66. If an animal is shown in a Fur Class, it must also have been shown in its respective Breed Class.

RULE 67. All Rabbits must be tattooed.

RABBIT MEAT PEN REQUIREMENTS

- RULE 68. Must be exhibited as a meat class only and may not be exhibited as a single entry or in a breed class.
- **RULE 69.** Meat Pens shall consist of 3 rabbits, all the same breed and variety. Broken meat pens must also be the same variety. A meat pen does not necessarily have to come from the same litter. Age limit is not over 9 weeks at the Johnson County Fair, and not over 10 weeks at the Wyoming State Fair. Minimum of 3 lbs., maximum of 5 lbs. each. All rabbits must be weighed in the presence of the judge.
- **RULE 70.** Single Fryer Not over 9 weeks of age by County Fair and not over 10 weeks by State Fair. Minimum weight of 3 lbs. and maximum weight of 5 lbs.
- RULE 71. Fryer Pens may not be exhibited in any other class.

LIVESTOCK CARE & SHOWING

- **RULE 72.** 4-H/FFA members from other counties will not be allowed to compete in the Youth Livestock Shows unless enrolled in a Johnson County 4-H club, Johnson County FFA Chapter or Clearmont FFA Chapter.
- **RULE 73.** Livestock Fitting Rule: 4-H and FFA members are expected to take care of, groom, and fit their own animal(s) at the Johnson County Fair. However, in the interest of safety and education, a member may be assisted by another Johnson County 4-H or FFA member, Parent of such member, Johnson County 4-H Leader or Johnson County FFA or Clearmont FFA Advisor. Be prepared to prove membership or leadership. Assistance from a non-Johnson County member will not be tolerated.
 - a. Assistance is defined as a learning situation, where the person doing the assisting is teaching the member a technique or proper skill.
- **RULE 74.** Substitute Showmen: Exhibitors must show and sell their own animals. Exceptions are allowed only in the case of two animals in the same class, or illness or injury of the owner. It is the owner's responsibility to bring forth their substitute reason and who will be substituting them to the Livestock Committee/Superintendents. (Substitute Showmen must be enrolled in Johnson County 4-H, Johnson County & Clearmont FFA Chapters.)
- RULE 75. Exhibitors are required to keep stalls and alleys clean, neat and presentable at all times.
- **RULE 76.** Random drug testing of show animals can/will be enforced on the county level.
- **RULE 77.** Youth that do not properly care for their animal, bedding, alleys, follow show rules, etc. will be asked to leave the Johnson County Fair, and will forfeit all premiums, awards, and sale privileges. Youth may also be excluded from participating in future fairs.
- **RULE 78.** All beef, goats, poultry, rabbits, sheep, and swine are checked in at the end of weigh-ins and will remain on the grounds until the end of fair/the Junior Livestock Sale.
- **RULE 79.** Early dismissal of an animal at the Johnson County Fair will require a written release from a veterinarian or permission from the Johnson County Livestock Committee/Superintendent.

4-H/FFA LIVESTOCK SALE

- **RULE 80.** The Johnson County Livestock Committee and/or buyers of livestock at the Johnson County 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale will <u>NOT</u> be responsible for any animal before, during, or after the sale. The buyer and youth need to make arrangements for slaughter and Wyoming State Fair bound animals are responsibility of the consigner.
- **RULE 81.** The Johnson County Livestock Committee does provide an insurance program for exhibitors to purchase for their animals.
- **RULE 82.** Exhibitors need to attend required meetings and turn in buyers cards by designated date to the extension office or fairboard office to receive a reduced commission on their sales
- **RULE 83.** Proof of ownership is required in order to sell animals at the JC Juninor Livestock Sale. Each exhibitor will be required to complete the sale information/consignment form within 60 minutes of the completion of that species show. Prior consignment is encouraged.
- **RULE 84.** The animal consigned will not be sold at the Johnson County 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale if the owner is not available when the member's name is called three (3) times. Prior arrangements need to be made in special circumstances with the livestock committee.
- RULE 85. Johnson County Junior Livestock Sale Order:
 - a. Novelty entries (i.e., poultry and rabbits) will be sold at the beginning of the 4-H/FFA Livestock sale.
 - b. These will be followed by the Grand and Reserve Champions of each species. Buyers of Grand and Reserve Champion animals will be invited to the sale ring at that time for a picture opportunity.
 - c. Following the grand and reserve sales will be Beef.
 - d. Sheep, Swine, and Goats will follow and alternate species each year.
- **RULE 86.** Each seller must give the ticket and buyers ribbon to the buyer of the animal before leaving the sale area.
- **RULE 87.** Exhibitors may begin removal of animals/equipment <u>AFTER</u> the 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale and must be off the grounds by 6:00 p.m. Sunday (last day of Fair). In unforeseen circumstances, please contact the Livestock Committee/Fair Board. Failure to adhere to this rule will result in loss of awards/premiums and may result in being excluded from participating in future fairs.



4H ROUND ROBIN SHOWMANSHIP

Rule 1. The first and second place show persons will be eligible for the round robin in the division of horses, sheep, swine, beef, market goats, market rabbit and market poultry. If in the event there are not Three (3) Senior showmen in the species. The species will be dropped from the round robin.

Rule 2. If a contestant wins two areas in the showmanship contest, or 4-H and FFA, he or she may choose the species and organization they wish to represent. Contestants will then be selected based on how they placed in their respective showmanship contest. A contestant can only win the local contest once but they can compete on the state level if they qualify during the state fair.

Rule 3. Contestants will wear long sleeve shirts and nice pants.

Rule 4. No hats will be worn by contestants.

Rule 5. Equipment for showing the different classes of livestock will be furnished by the contestant winning their respective areas.

Rule 6. The champion show person will receive a buckle. 1 st place will be 40.00, 2 nd 30.00, 3 rd 20.00 and 4 th 10.00. Winner will receive a scholarship from Sheridan College. It will be split equally between 4H and FFA.

Rule 7. Each contestant will show all classes of livestock.

Rule 8. There will be 20 points on the grooming score. Judges will examine the animals as a committee and give each contestant a score.

Rule 9. Each area will be judged for a total of four minutes. At two minutes, the contestants will switch animals within that given area of livestock. There will be twenty points possible for the show person's performance.

Rule 10. Holders will be provided to control animal while contestants rotate to each showing area and provide assistance when necessary.

Rule 11. In the event of a tie, the judges will draw the four species in order before the contest begins to break any ties. The first species that is not common to either contestant will be used to break the tie.

Rule 12. Judges will be selected by a FFA Advisor and 4-H representative.

Rule 13. The animal brought to the round robin must be the animal that was exhibited in each organization's respective showmanship class. 14. Exhibitors may only win ONE time per organization.



FFA ROUND ROBIN SHOWMANSHIP

- **Rule 1**. The first and second place show persons will be eligible for the round robin in the division of horses, sheep, swine, and beef.
- **Rule 2.** If a contestant wins two areas in the showmanship contest, he or she may choose the species they wish to compete with. Contestants will then be selected based on how they placed in their respective showmanship contest. A contestant can only win the local contest once but they can compete on the state level if they qualify during the state fair.
- **Rule 3.** Contestants will wear official FFA dress. Girls and boys may use black wranglers and follow the rest of the official dress.
- Rule 4. No hats will be worn by contestants.
- **Rule 5.** Equipment for showing the different classes of livestock will be furnished by the contestants winning their respective areas.
- Rule 6. The champion show person will receive a buckle donated by the Buffalo, Kaycee & Clearmont FFA chapters. Cash awards will be the following: first \$40, second \$30, third \$20 and fourth \$10. Winner will receive a scholarship from Sheridan College. It will be split equally between 4H and FFA.
- Rule 7. Each contestant will show all classes of livestock.
- **Rule 8.** There will be 20 points on the grooming score. Judges will examine the animals as a committee and give each contestant a score.
- **Rule 9.** Each area will be judged for a total of four minutes. At two minutes, the contestants will switch animals within that given area of livestock. There will be twenty points possible for the show person's performance.
- **Rule 10.** Holders will be provided to control animals while contestants rotate to each showing area and provide assistance when necessary.
- **Rule 11. In** the event of a tie, the judges will draw the four species in order before the contest begins to break any ties. The first species that is not common to either contestant will be used to break the tie.
- **Rule 12.** The animal brought to the round robin must be the animal that was exhibited in each organization's respective showmanship class.
- Rule 13. Exhibitors may only win ONE time per organization.




- Division and class numbers for all 4-H and FFA livestock **EXCEPT HORSE** (Department 16 of the Exhibit Book) will be found in the current year's State Fair Premium Book which will be made available through the Extension Office.
- **RULE 1.** All animals shown in this Department must be carried as a 4-H or FFA project and owned by the individual according to the rules of their respective program.
- **RULE 2.** Individuals may exhibit two animals per class number in any of the livestock classes. In market classes, each weight division will be considered a class. Each animal, market or breeding, needs to be entered individually on the entry form. Each market animal must be identified by a State Fair Tag number.
- RULE 3. All individuals must be present for the judging of their exhibits.
- **RULE 4.** All Market Beef animals must be owned by the exhibitor on or before February 1 of the exhibiting year. Market Sheep and Market Swine must be in exhibitor's possession by June 1. All other breeding animals must be in exhibitor's possession by June 1.
- **RULE 5.** All animals offered for sale through the Junior Livestock Sale will be weighed at the Fairgrounds.
- **RULE 6.** Proof of ownership is to be brought to fair. The brand inspection/title is to be turned in at fair with consignment forms for consigned animals only. Individuals showing market animals will be allowed to sell one animal through the Junior Livestock Sale.
- RULE 7. Light animals (not making minimum weight) can be shown in feeder classes.
- **RULE 8.** All animals sold must have been shown in market class.
 - a. Showmanship is a compulsory entry at the Johnson County Fair. Members that do not participate in showmanship classes are not allowed to participate in any market class. Participation in a market class is required to be eligible for the 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale. Therefore, individuals not participating in a Showmanship class (within the species they consign) will not be allowed to sell an animal at the 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale.
- **RULE 9.** Johnson County 4-H and FFA members may be assisted by enrolled Johnson County 4-H volunteers, FFA advisors, Extension Educators, and other Johnson County 4-H and FFA members in fitting animals for show. (Parents or leaders/advisors will be allowed to help with fitting and care of the 4-H and FFA animals, however YOUTH MUST BE PRESENT at all times during the fitting and care of animals <u>and</u> actively helping with the care and fitting of the animals.) See Rule 87 in the Wyoming State Fair Contest Handbook.
- RULE 10. Exhibitors are required to keep stalls and alleys clean, neat and presentable at all times.
- RULE 11. All exhibitors of Champion and Reserve Champions are expected to participate in the Parade of Champions.
- **RULE 12.** Pens will be cleaned after release of livestock. Market animals left for delivery will be cared for before leaving the grounds and area cleaned appropriately.
- **RULE 13.** The Johnson County Junior Livestock Committee follows the previous Wyoming State Fair weight classes for each species.
- **RULE 14.** Lamb tail docking policies will follow Wyoming State Fair Policies. See Rule 33 in the Wyoming State Fair Contest Handbook.



Supreme Cow Contest

Special Award – The Johnson County Cattlemen's Association will provide cash awards to 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and 5th place in the heifer phase of the Supreme Cow Contest. The 1st place winner of the cow-calf phase will receive the opportunity to select a heifer calf from the herd of a local breeder. 2nd and 3rd place winners will receive cash prizes provided by the Johnson County Cattlemen's Association.

- RULE 1. 4-H or FFA members must be enrolled in the Breeding Beef Project.
- **RULE 2.** Judges will be a panel of four, including the official beef judge and three commercial cattlemen chose by the Supreme Cow Committee.
- **RULE 3.** Exhibitors must bring their Supreme Cow Record Book to the Weigh-in and give it to the Cattlemen's Committee.
- RULE 4. You may also enter these same cattle in Junior Breeding Beef.
- RULE 5. The yearling heifer must have been weighed and identified at the winter weigh-in.
- **RULE 6.** The heifer (bred at fair time) will be shown at halter.
- RULE 7. Heifer must have been shown in Phase I the previous year.
- RULE 8. The cow and calf will be judged as a pair and the record book will be evaluated in Phase II.





DEPARTMENT 16

Junior Horse

DIVISION 1615 Halter Horse

- **RULE 1.** In order to register for Fair exhibits, youth and horses must have completed the Wyoming 4-H Safety Test Evaluation for each horse to be exhibited.
- **RULE 2.** All breeds of halter horses will be shown together, divided into sex and age classes as listed below.
- **RULE 3.** Questions in the absence of specific rules shall be governed by the "Wyoming Junior Horse Show Rule Book."
- RULE 4. Stallions will not be allowed.
- **RULE 5.** Horse's Age In referring to a horse's age, the birth date is January 1 of the year born, and horse becomes a year older on January 1 of the year following its birth. Example a foal born May 2012 becomes one year old on January 1, 2013.

<u>CLASS</u>

- 1. Ponies, 54 inches and under
- 2. Filly, 1 year
- 3. Filly, 2 years
- 4. Mare, 3 years and under 8
- 5. Mare, 8 years and older
- 6. Gelding, 1 years and under 2
- 7. Gelding, 2 years and under 3
- 8. Gelding, 3 years and under 8
- 9. Gelding, 8 years and over

DIVISION 1616 Horse Performance

- **RULE 1.** All classes at the Fair will be divided into Junior and Senior. Within the Junior Division, there will be three groups A, B, and C. The child, the parent and the leader will decide which group the horse best fits in. Group A is the most advanced.
- **RULE 2.** A member can show a horse in one group in one class and in another group in another class, if that is where the evaluation shows that horse fits.
- **RULE 3.** A member may show more than one horse in any class with an individual pattern except Western and English Pleasure.
- **RULE 4.** An All Around Performance Horse award will be given in all divisions, based on points accumulated by one horse and one rider.
- **RULE 5.** Barrels and Poles Everyone runs the pattern and the times are split into groups depending on how many entries there are.
- **RULE 6.** Working cow horse will only be open in Senior & Junior Group A riders.

EQUITATION

- GROUP A Western: May include walk and sitting trot, straight lines, circles, stops, turn on haunches, back in strait line and circle, turn on the forehand, simple and flying lead changes, circle in counter lead, lope from walk/stop, extended trot, gallop or hand gallop, back up. English: Same as Western but including rising trot, riding without stirrups, change of diagonal.
- GROUP B Western: Same as Group A except flying lead changes are not required.
 English: Same as Group A except simple lead changes are allowed.
- GROUP C Western: May include: walk & sitting trot, straight lines, circles, stops, serpentine. English: Rising trot.

REINING

- **GROUP A** Reining pattern from 4-H Rule Book with either simple or flying lead change as specified by judge.
- **GROUP B** Same as Group A except simple lead changes are allowed.
- **GROUP C** Pattern to be determined by the judge. Can be done at a trot.

SHOWMANSHIP

- GROUP A Judged on: safe leading & spacing, precision of pattern, turns, straightness of walk & trot, use of the quarter system, grooming, appearance, attitude and questions. Pattern to be selected by the Judge.
- **GROUP B** Same as Group A.
- **GROUP C** Same as Group A, but with a simpler pattern.

TRAIL

- **GROUP A** Obstacles may include walkovers elevated or not, serpentine, cones, square box, bridge, mailbox, side pass, carry an item from place to another, dismount and lead, slicker, gate. Gaits will include walk, trot, and lope. NO plastic to walk over, water, plastic PVC pipe or unnatural objects.
- **GROUP B** Same as Group A except simple lead changes are allowed.
- **GROUP C** Same as Group A except no lope, gate.

WESTERN RIDING

- **GROUP A** Same as Group A except Flying Lead Changes are not required.
- **GROUP B** Same as Group A except simple lead changes are allowed.
- **GROUP C** Loping is optional. Pattern may include circles, stops, serpentine, strait lines, back up.

WORKING COW HORSE

GROUP A – Exhibitors will attend a practice and demonstrate knowledge and ability in the class before they can participate. The judge has the right to award a second cow to an exhibitor if he/she deems that the first cow is not workable.



The Wyoming State Fair premium book will be used to enter FFA projects for County Fair, Classroom, Farm mechanics, and Agronomy exhibits will be entered under the FFA Department 17. Livestock will be entered under the Junior Livestock Division (Department 16). Horses will be entered from this premium book (Department 16) State Fair Books may be used or secured through your FFA advisor.

- RULE 1. All exhibitors must be members of the FFA
- RULE 2. All exhibits must be from students' projects.
- **RULE 3.** FFA exhibits must be in place and release at times established by the Fair Management. Permission to alter the time of entry or release may be granted by the Fair Management under special circumstances.
- **RULE 4.** The exhibits will be judged on the Danish or American System. Each exhibit will be awarded a blue, red, or white ribbon. Purple ribbons may be awarded to exceptional exhibits.
- **RULE 5.** The Johnson County Fair Board will pay the State Fair Trips for Senior 4H & FFA youth exhibitors in the following areas, as long as funds are available. A trip will consist of the registration fee, a meal ticket, a wristband (dorms) and any stall fees. Trips included are for the following events:
- **RULE 6.** FFA Showmanship Contest Winners in Beef, Sheep, Swine, Horse.
- RULE 7. Johnson County Champion Market Beef, Market Sheep, and Market Swine.
- RULE 8. Johnson County Senior High Point Performance (horse) Winner.
- RULE 9. FFA Members must meet the record book requirements of the FFA program.
- RULE 10. FFA Members will follow the code of ethics as outlined in the official FFA manual.
- **RULE 11.** Members will follow all guidelines that are required by the Fair Management.
- RULE 12. FFA Members must show at County Fair in order to show at State Fair.







Read General Rules and Regulations in front of book and specific requirements for this Department.

Division and Class number for all 4-H general; family consumer science will be found in the current year's Wyoming State Fair Premium Catalog which will be made available to the clubs through the Extension Office. Horses will be entered from this Premium Book (Department 16). Exhibitors are reminded to carefully read all instructions at the beginning of Division in order to have exhibits meet State Fair requirements.

- **RULE 1.** Only bona fide club members of Johnson County 4-H Club are eligible to compete in the Department. They must have been properly enrolled in the 4-H Program prior to entering exhibits.
- RULE 2. A club member must be enrolled in the project in which he or she exhibits
- **RULE 3.** The Johnson County Fair Board will pay the State Fair or State contest trips for Senior 4-H & FFA youth exhibitors in the following areas: registrations fee, a meal ticket, a wristband (dorms) and any stall fees. Trips included are for the following events:
 - a. Senior Division 4-H Produce Evaluation Contest (vegetable judging now is conducted at Showcase Showdown) team is at least 3, up to 4 members.
 - b. Senior Division 4-H Livestock Judging Team up to 4 members
 - c. Senior Division 4-H Wool Judging Team (held in April) up to 4 members
 - d. Senior Division 4-H Style Revue Winners all eligible Seniors
 - e. Senior 4-H Showmanship Contest Winners in Beef, Sheep, Swine, Horse, Rabbit, Poultry, Goat, Dog, and Cat.
 - f. Johnson County Champion Market Beef, Market Sheep, Champion Market Goat, and Market Swine.
 - g. Johnson County Senior High Point Performance (horse) Winner.

*Fees for additional stalls needed by youth bringing additional animals may not be provided.

*When a Johnson County Senior Team or Individual is not competing at the State contest, the next highest age category team will be eligible to receive the special awards fees to compete
